

## Requesting a Humanities or Social Science Tutor

For help writing papers, see the Writing Center website [www.yale.edu/writing](http://www.yale.edu/writing). If your difficulty in a course is not related to writing papers, download and complete the form below to request a course tutor. Course tutors are undergraduate or graduate students who will meet with you one-on-one to discuss readings, lectures, and exam preparation. Please note: tutors must normally be requested before the seventh week of the term, and in order to qualify for this kind of tutoring, you must be able to demonstrate academic difficulty. (Usually, this means you are on track to receive a grade of C or lower in the course.)

There are three steps to this application. (1) Talk to your professor or TF to see if tutoring is appropriate. (2) Fill out the first section of this form and ask the professor or TF to fill out the middle section. (3) The form then goes to your residential college dean, who will review it and send it to the Humanities and Social Science tutoring office. Once the form is complete, that office will contact you to arrange a meeting with a tutor.
